
Dear Families/Whanau

Well, with winter well and truly upon us, we find ourselves battling the usual runny noses, coughs and colds. Please familiarise yourselves with our sickness policies and the stand down periods that go with these. However, if you feel your child is unable to cope with the usual busy day in our kiwi room, please keep them home. If they fade during the day we will contact you for your child to be picked up.

Even though the weather is not always great at this time of year, we do try to get our tamariki outside to play if it is not raining. They all love getting outdoors, and it is so good for them to be able to explore and get fresh air. Utilising our outdoor environment is a very important part of our curriculum, and we love to see all tamariki participating in this. Please be assured we always make sure they are warm enough to go out, and are promptly changed into dry clothes once we come back inside, if needed. Please ensure there are at least 3 changes of clothes in your child's bag, to allow for these clothes changes.

Lately we have been exploring a range of different art and sensory play activities, for our tamariki to participate in. We have made playdough, gloop, paintings, and stress balls in the past couple of weeks. The tamariki love getting in amongst all of these activities, and enjoy experiencing different smells, textures, and colours. We will continue to research new and exciting sensory activities to provide our tamariki.

What a busy month July has become with some changes happening around the place. We welcomed Danjelle with open arms to the Pukeko room and the children already know and love her. We are going to miss our dear Rita who had her last day with us on the August 5^{th} . We wish her all the very best! We also bid a sad farewell to Roman, Milad and Rowan as they leave for school. We would like to thank Kate and John (Rowan's parents) for the 30 fluorescent reflector vests gift. The children enjoy wearing them on their visits to the school and library. We also have a new face here in the Pukeko room, Ciara who is a first year student from Unitec.

We have had a few chilly mornings and the children enjoy exploring the icy textures and puddles in the garden. Please make sure that your child is dressed warmly and has lots of spare clothes (labelled) in the bag.

This month we are focusing on literacy. A few of our children have turned four and are interested in recognising numbers. We have provided the children with lots of experiences in numeracy by using puzzles, games and by screen printing numbers to build on their interests. If you have bottle covers please feel free to send them in and we will utilise them to make a mural of numbers for a wall.

The children have been learning about health and well-being. We are learning about how bugs are spread and how we can stop the spread of illnesses through ensuring we are using good hygiene practices. To help to reinforce this we encourage you to remind your child regarding practices such as coughing into their elbows instead of their hands, washing hands as well as using a tissue to blow their noses.

We have set up a 'hospital' in the dramatic area and the children are enacting what they have learnt. Please feel free to bring in any spare supplies for our 'hospital play' such as bandages and toy stethoscopes.

Our whānau board is now inside the Pukeko room. If you have not brought in your whānau picture, can you please do so. We also have a cultural board representing all our cultures in the Pukeko room. Please feel free to take a look on your next visit to the room.
